SUBJECT/INFORMATION UPDATES

Drama

Once again, a very happy Friday to you all. This week's article has a slightly different theme from our usual subject update – however it's still absolutely relevant to our subject and the wider cultural life of Harlow Town.

This week I have been lucky enough to go and watch a wonderful performance from the Livewire Collective. Many of you may already be familiar with their work and their founder Sam Ashford, who has been a figure in the arts lives of Harlow's young people for a good many years now.

On Sunday evening I went to see Play Dead, Livewire's latest creation, in Harlow Playhouse's main auditorium. The play is largely devised with the young people involved in the show and accompanied by original songs and soundtrack from the music branch of the organisation. It also includes choreography from their dance cohort too. A full-on performing arts feast you might say! The piece focusses on toxic masculinity and its impact on individuals across the decades, as we see scenes from the 80s, 90s and 2020's unfold, all set in the same university accommodation. Topics covered include toxic relationships and domestic violence, victim-blaming, sexual abuse and stalking. Pretty heavy-going stuff but interlaced so well and with enough care and love for all characters involved to be presented as well-rounded and believable. The cast of young actors (teens to 20s) did a smashing job of delivering a thought-provoking and sensitive piece that ends with a hopeful message, despite some very relevant and important dark moments within it.

Accompanied by a multi-skilled and tight sounding band, with scenes interspersed and enhanced by some beautifully choreographed dance routines to help communicate the story imaginatively and with feeling.

But why am I banging on about this in the principal's letter I hear you wonder (yes, my ears are that good I can even hear your thoughts, I've been teaching too long for them not to be!)? Well, this drama teacher from Passmores Academy felt an overwhelming sense of pride throughout the show (my second time seeing it btw!) because so many Passmores pupils, past and present, made up the cast and band. Nearly a third of the performers I saw on stage have come through our doors and some will have turned up to school as usual this week. We know we work hard to maintain the arts in our curriculum and to see our learners continue to explore and invest in that outside of our organisation is delightful. The fact that our alumni are still involved in the arts (probably alongside a full-time job — we all know getting it to pay is the tough bit!) is a wonderful testimony to the creative experiences they were able to access within their curriculum at Passmores and hopefully the positive experiences they had within our walls. Harlow has always had a wonderful arts culture since its birth as a new town in the 50s, and to see current and previous students continue to contribute to this in our local community, as well as further afield, makes it all worthwhile as we approach the end of another challenging teaching year, where we continue to see funding cuts and arts disappearing from the curriculum nationally. Huge thanks and love go to all my arts peers that work tirelessly to keep things creative and exciting for young people and the audiences of Harlow Town, providing inspiring opportunities and access to the arts locally.

Level 1 Plastering Course:

This is a new course, which aims to progress students either to a Level 2 Plastering course after completion of our Level 1 course or to apply to an apprenticeship programme. They can also apply for another study programme course in construction or a different industry completely. The level will be determined by their tutor and based on grades.

T level foundation course in science and engineering

The T level foundation courses are for students who want to complete a T Level course but have not achieved their English and/or Maths GCSE. The foundation course provides them with the underpinning knowledge towards starting their T Level, whilst giving them time to resit and attain their Maths and/or English.

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The Children's Society East

Our CHHAT groups focus on promoting positive emotional and mental wellbeing for 8 – 18 yr olds, with these particular sessions focussing on children in **years 8 & 9**.

The team use a range of techniques tailored to support each young person to develop their emotional resilience; with the group programme aiming to help young people build self-esteem and confidence.

The service is open to children and young people who have parents or family members who are misusing substances or have been impacted by a family member's mental health.

We aim to create a safe, confidential space for these children and young people and will signpost/support additional referrals if appropriate.

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about

NINTENDOSWITCH2

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

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Nintendo launched its Switch 2 games console in early June 2025 – its first new console in eight years. While it builds on the original's success by remaining compatible with certain existing games, it also adds powerful hardware and new features like GameChat and a USB-C camera. As more children look to upgrade, it's important to understand how this new console might affect their play and safety.

EASIER TO ACCESS MATURE CONTENT




Despite Nintendo's reputation for family-friendly titles, mature games like Cyberpunk 2077 and Hitman have been released onto the platform. With the Switch 2's improved performance, developers will be able to port even more mature-rated games. These may appeal to children due to their popularity, but they contain content that is highly unsuitable for young audiences.

IN-APP & GAME STORE PURCHASES

The Nintendo eShop enables purchases with just a few taps. If payment details are saved and PIN protection is disabled, children may unknowingly make costly purchases — including game add—ons, cosmetic items or entire new releases — without parental approva

UNRESTRICTED ONLINE PLAY IN SOME GAMES



GAMECHAT & REAL-TIME VOICE COMMUNICATION

GameChat enables live chatting with up to 12 people, even across different games, with optional video and screen–sharing. Though children under 16 are restricted to chatting only with approved friends, the sheer interactivity could raise privacy concerns or create pressure to remain online longer.

CAMERA COMPATIBILITY & PRIVACY CONCERNS

The optional USB-C camera supports video calling and facial overlays in games; however, this also raises the risk of cyberbullying or the unwanted sharing of personal images. The camera can be disabled, removed or covered, and parental controls are essential to manage how and when it is used.

POWERFUL PULL OF FAMILIAR CHARACTERS

Nintendo's mascot, Mario – along with Pikachu, Donkey Kong and others – remains hugely appealing to younger audiences, especially after the success of the recent film, 'The Super Mario Bros. Movie' (2023). These beloved icons are central to Nintendo's branding and often feature in merchandising, adverts and in-game promotions, creating strong emotional attachments in children and a sense of urgency to keep up with their peers.

Advice for Parents & Educators

CHECK RATINGS & USE PARENTAL CONTROLS

Every Switch and Switch 2 game comes with a PEGI age rating. Before buying one, ensure the content matches your child's age. Use the Nintendo Parental Controls app to monitor gameplay, set screen-time limits and manage friend requests.

REMOVE OR RESTRICT PAYMENT METHODS

Avoid accidental spending by unlinking credit cards from the device. Instead, consider adding funds via prepaid eShop cards or requiring a PIN for purchases Some banking apps can also be set to approve transactions manua

REVIEW FRIEND LISTS AND CHAT PERMISSIONS


Child profiles are restricted to chatting with approved friends only, but it's good practice to regularly check their friend list and communication settings. Use the Parental Controls app to switch off voice or video chat if necessary.


ENCOURAGE OPEN CONVERSATIONS

Teach children how to block, report and capture any behaviour or content that makes them uncomfortable. The console's built-in tools allow them to create screenshots and video clips, which can aid in reporting any issues. Keeping an open dialogue helps children feel supported and safe.
